In search of art instruction, Pat visited galleries in Tulsa to research opportunities to learn sculpting. A gallery suggested that he visit with a group of sculptors which met once a month. Since this was a gathering of sculptors from the Oklahoma Sculpture Society, it appeared that this art form was destined to be a part of Pat's life. They did not give

classes, but still they took Pat under their wing and taught him how to sculpt.

He continues to advance his skills by his participation in art workshops. Pat's commitment to art expression includes a home workshop of his own, added during construction of his house here at Hyde Park. It provides a warm and inviting space for him and his wife Sandy to work on their individual projects. The result of Pat's artistic expression is an outpouring of art evident throughout his house.
